Unit 1		
Course Foundations		
Summary and Rationale		
<p>This course is designed for students who are interested in art or fashion design as a career path. The course will trace the history of fashion design and the way that various themes have been interpreted from different time periods and cultures. Students will explore trends and garments from history using visual and contextual analysis; compare them to contemporary trends; and explore the social, cultural, and political aspects of fashion design. Students will also create their own unique ideas based on historical elements through fashion sketching, creative journaling, and learning basic sewing skills.</p> <p>This unit will develop an understanding of the role of composition in fashion design, how to create fashion sketches, and how to use a garment or other artifacts of material culture as historic documents. Through the study of fashion history and criticism, students will be able to identify time periods, influences, impacts, and styles from a variety of sources, time periods, and cultures. Students will learn to apply the skills and techniques for creating a strong concept in terms of fashion (model sketch, fabric study, patterns, silhouettes, etc.) to their own designs, as well as using those skills to analyze and interpret fashion from a global and historical perspective.</p> <p>In addition to the study of composition, students will learn to respond to and connect to fashion and accessories from across the globe, time periods, and cultures. A variety of thinking routines will be utilized when looking at and responding to art works.</p> <p>Through the development of a sketchbook and mood boards, students will also be exposed to and practice using a variety of media, tools, and techniques to prepare them for deeper explorations of different themes, subjects, media, and meanings throughout this course.</p>

Tier 1 Modifications and Accommodations

Including special education students, Multilingual Language Learners (MLLs), students at risk of school failure, gifted and talented students, and students with 504 plans

Special Education/IEP/504 - Modifications and accommodations must be aligned to the stated plan and uphold expectations of the plan lawfully. Every student requires a different set of accommodations based upon need. Examples specific to visual arts practice include, but are not limited to:

- Follow individual IEP/504 plans for specific modifications.
- Preferential seating
- Extended/Additional time for assessments
- Behavior management support
- Assignments/resources in electronic and physical format
- Break down assignments with oral directions, written directions, and visuals.
- Provide frequent reminders to stay on task and reinforce on-task behavior
- Work on organizational skills
- Provide visual supports

Summary and Rationale

<p>This unit will continue to explore the compositional and historical concepts taught in the previous units, with a focus on students creating their own designs. Students will explore various sewing and garment construction techniques, with a focus on designing their own line.</p> <p>After studying composition and the elements of art and principles of design and fashion history, students will apply that knowledge to creating dynamic fashion designs. Students will explore form and function through the creation of a garment for a doll with fabric and traditional hand-sewing techniques, recycling/repurposing to create a new garment, and exploring non-traditional materials to create a garment (newspaper, duct tape, etc.), and designing and creating accessories to complement the outfits.</p> <p>Students will continue to explore art history and art criticism by studying art works that are relevant to the subject, theme, or media of the current project.</p>

Tier 1 Modifications and Accommodations

Including special education students, Multilingual Language Learners (MLLs), students at risk of school failure, gifted and talented students, and students with 504 plans

Special Education/IEP/504 - Modifications and accommodations must be aligned to the stated plan and uphold expectations of the plan lawfully. Every student requires a different set of accommodations based upon need. Examples specific to visual arts practice include, but are not limited to:

- Follow individual IEP/504 plans for specific modifications.
- Preferential seating
- Extended/Additional time for assessments
- Behavior management support
- Assignments/resources in electronic and physical format
- Break down assignments with oral directions, written directions, and visuals.
- Provide frequent reminders to stay on task and reinforce on-task behavior
- Provide visual supports
- Partnering/Grouping of students
- Re-teaching and review
- Multi-media approach to accommodate various learning styles
- Decrease/Modify number of project requirements
- Teacher/Aide/Para assistance
- Demonstrations of techniques on an individual level
- Show slide presentations to encourage exploration of project ideas

MLL - Teachers identify the modifications that they will use in the unit as related to the needs of their student population.

Examples specific to visual arts practice include, but are not limited to:

- Allow the use of Google Translate where appropriate.
- Provide alternate ways for the student to respond (verbal/pictographic answers instead of written)
- Provide model sentence frames and sentence starters for both oral responses and written responses
- Provide additional time to complete assessments and assignments
- Model and use gestures or visuals to aid in understanding
- Present instructions both verbally and visually
- Simplify written and verbal instructions
- Speak clearly and naturally, and try to enunciate words, especially their ending sounds.
- Provide Visual, Graphic, Interactive, and/or Sensory Supports
- Simplify the language, format, and directions of the assessment
- When showing videos, use Closed Captioning.
- Support use of student's primary language by translating key words in directions, or key vocabulary terms or giving students opportunities to communicate in their primary language (written or orally)

Gifted and Talented/Enrichment - Utilize differentiation in the areas of acceleration, enrichment, and grouping. Examples specific to visual arts practice include, but are not limited to:

- Complex, in-depth research assignments
- Independent study where applicable
- Provide a variety of individualized work centers or student choice
- Lead demonstrations for class
- Create additional project(s) in a different medium, exploring a different technique, style, or subject.
- Individual presentation
- Multiple mediums in project
